Role of Committee:

The District Restart "Advisory" Committee was formed as part of the NJDOE "Road Back: Restart and Recovery Plan for Education" to provide various district and community stakeholders with an opportunity to provide meaningful input as we move forward in developing our district reopening plans for September.

Restart & Recovery Plan Four Key Areas:

- Conditions for Learning
- Leadership and Planning
- Policy and Funding
- Continuity of Learning

Restart & Recovery Plan Guidance:

- Absent a shift in public health data, schools and districts must reopen for modified in-person instruction and operations at the start of the 2020-2021 school year.
- Must comply with CDC, state, and local guidelines. Districts should abide by the advice of local health officials to determine the safest course of action based on local circumstances, which will change as the public health landscape evolves.
- Social distancing will be the guiding principle.
- Many schools and districts will have to operate school buildings at reduced capacity, requiring the establishment of hybrid learning environments (in-person and virtual/remote).
- Districts need to be prepared to pivot to virtual remote instruction at any time during the school year.
- Students/Staff shall wear face coverings

- Critical Areas of Operation

- Staffing (Including substitutes)
- Technology Resources

Critical Areas of Operation:

- Master Schedules (Plans) for each Building
- Options: In-Person or Virtual/Remote Learning for Students
- Option: for Virtual/Remote Teaching for Staff
- Social Distancing of Staff & Students (To the greatest extent possible)
- Face Coverings for Staff & Students (Required)
- School Transportation
- Cleaning and Disinfecting Procedures
- Student Flow (enter & exit buildings, common areas)
- Screening Staff and Students
- Response to Students/Staff Presenting Symptoms (Contact Tracing)
- Academic, Social, Emotional, and Behavioral Supports
- Child Care (HTSACC)

District Reopening Schedules:

Plan A:

 Schools will reopen for students/staff in-person learning all day everyday

Plan B:

 Schools will reopen for students/staff in-person learning everyday on a modified early dismissal schedule

• Plan C:

 Schools will reopen with cohorts of students for in-person instruction using a "hybrid" model (mix of virtual/remote and in-person learning)

Plan D:

Virtual/Remote learning all students/staff

Reopening Schedules as of July 17th:

- Elementary Schools (BMS, MTV, SDS):
 - "Plan B:"
 - Schools will reopen for students/staff in-person learning everyday on a modified early dismissal schedule
 - Will have a have virtual/remote cohorts as needed
 - Modified Early Dismissal Schedule (8:45 AM 12:45 PM)
- Middle School (MJS):
 - "Plan C:"
 - Schools will reopen with cohorts of students for in-person instruction using a "hybrid" model (mix of virtual/remote and in-person learning)
 - Using "A/B" Cohorts of students
 - Virtual/remote cohort follow same schedule as in-person learning cohort
 - Modified Early Dismissal Schedule (8:00 AM 12:15 PM)
